School Evolution

Many of you may have been noticing the increase of renovations and changes throughout our school. From the massive scaffolding outside the aula to the renovation of our library, restorations have been in full effect. For those of you wondering just why this is the case, here are your answers.

RENOVATIONS IN AND OUTSIDE THE AULA

The ceiling of the aula has been criticized frequently for being unsafe and inadequate for the acoustics. Therefore our school has invested in renovating the ceiling inside the cafeteria. The old wooden boards that used to make up part of the roof will be removed and replaced with a much more secure roofing.

Similarly, the top of the auditorium has undergone renovations to ensure greater safety, to prevent any further leaks and to insulate against the cold.

"CHILL OUT AREA"

The Student Council's plan for the "chill out area" has been put in action. Money from the FunRun is currently still being

collected to pay for this; however a designer has been contacted and proposed to set up certain benches in an area in the school. Since there are some problems with fire regulations and lockers blocking possible space, the SC is doing their best to find the optimal location for such an area. One option would be removing the lockers in front of the substitution board in the blue building and replacing them with these benches or another would setting them up near bathrooms on the 1st floor of the blue building. Hopefully, the "chill out area" will be installed during the remainder of this school year.

CHANGES IN THE LIBRARY

As many may have noticed, Lutz Hoffman has returned to his position in the library after fall break. Being that our school concluded a contract with an

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agency supplying us with outside employees, Lutz Hoffman was away before being hired again a few weeks ago.

In addition, the library has seen further changes over the past few weeks. Librarian Lucy Scott-Kellermeier stated that about 654 students traffic in and out of the library daily, which is the reason why a new carpet has been laid around the

circulation desk. Furthermore, new books and DVD's have been added to the Library's vast collection, and new tables and display cases are on their way. New Database trials have been created, and all students are invited to try them out. Our librarian has started a weekly tutorial session on Wednesday's 6th period to introduce the new programs and databases.

Lack of Student Input Allows for Campus Restriction

As of the 26th of November, all 10th graders are prohibited from leaving the JFKS campus during the day.

How did it come to this? When a 2013 class trip resulted in three conferences and an expulsion, the administration began questioning the wisdom of letting younger students "run free" on trips abroad and on campus.

A Schulkonferenz vote was scheduled.

Our principals Mr. Salzer and Fr. Roschel went to the first student council meeting, explained the situation, and encouraged the students to form a committee that would consider the above proposal and offer alternatives (that 2nd semester 10th graders have more freedom, for example)

Mr. Salzer approached our Student Council presidents several times, asking about progress on the issue. No students offered to create the committee, and the SC presidents failed to take action.

At the *Schulkonferenz* meeting, the issue was put on the table for a vote. Last year's SC president, Reyk Börner, and I found ourselves single-handedly pushing against the new campus limitations. Ultimately, however, we could not argue against what the teachers, faculty, and principals found obvious: "The students don't care about this issue."

In the meeting, Mr. Salzer respectfully pointed out that he had announced this issue to the entire SC and followed-up with the presidents, even proposing a few compromises of his own. He heard nothing back from the students. There were no e-mails in his inbox from concerned students, no lunch-time chats in his office and, most importantly, no student committee to sway the *Schulkonferenz* board. It

was clear: "the students don't care." The vote was passed. The principals, aware of the student body's silence, graciously agreed to hear the topic again *if* the students could organize an opposition. (Anyone can propose an issue to be voted on by the *Schulkonferenz*.)

When presented with a situation where the students appear indifferent, members of the administration are

always going to make the decision that is easiest for them, which makes perfect sense. Does it make sense that "the students don't care?" To me it does not. I know that 10th graders want to enjoy simple freedoms, and that 9th graders look forward to being treated more like adults. Unfortunately, I also know that this decision will stay in place until the student body decides they do care about the issue. This could happen next spring, or ten years from now. Either way, the change will happen only if young students deem it worth the effort to argue for their right to leave campus.

One Does Not Simply Get Into College

The weather change in November triggers not only an epidemic of common colds and seasonal depression but also intensifies the general fatigue and lack of motivation prevalent amongst many high school students, known as senioritis. If at some point you feel overwhelmed with a simple in-class assignment, drowned by homework, and unable to keep up with fast-paced courses, your condition might hinder you in meeting external deadlines, notably college applications. This process requires extensive research, writing, and test preparation; anxiety, however, is counterproductive.

Regardless of where you will apply, put your own expectations first. Often, you can narrow down your options by determining a set of physical, academic, and socio-cultural environments that appeal to you. Consider your preferences: Rural or urban? Big or small? Old or new? Religious affiliation or not? Party school or grind school? What financial aid is available? And

of course, how academically rigorous is it? If you are interested in the US, keep in mind that according to the National Center for Education Statistics about 80% of students change their major at least once, so aim for strength in all departments. Don't be seduced by a university's reputation at the cost of your comfort. Although transferring is always a possibility, ideally you will spend 3-4 years at the same institution. Additionally, many colleges promote ethnic diversity to simulate "real world" experiences. Finally, campus visits, fairs, and interviews convey interest and establish personal contact, which may influence your choices and boost your chances of admission.

Once you have set your goals on specific universities, familiarize yourself with their entrance requirements and deadlines. The minimum GPA to get into a fairly decent college is around 3.0 on a 4.0 scale. Flexible and holistic

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Selection criteria evaluate the individual behind the applicant, and therefore demand a wide array of components for consideration including personal statements, standardized test scores, teacher recommendations, extracurricular involvement and achievement, volunteer work and/or class rank, etc. Numerical reports on these qualifications develop over two (Abitur) or four (diploma) years of high school, while the categorical resume usually reflects your entire high school career depending on the particularity of the college area.

The application essay should reflect your motivations and passions through your individual writing voice. The content focus varies between primarily course-related (UK), personal (US), and a blend of the two (Canada and Australia). The challenge of the personal statement lies in a mature and concise but specific representation of your values.

It is never too early to start actively crafting your college application. Do not take it lightly, especially when you are little over a month away from the deadline. However, do not neglect yourself in the process. Accumulating schoolwork and extracurricular commitments can throw a monkey wrench into your plans to remain organized. Pre-schedule social activities and apply stress-management techniques to stay healthy and happy. Know the difference between knowledge and skills learnt in high school –you will need both to succeed in college.

The Best Christmas Markets

First place is the Gendarmenmarkt Christmas Market

There are live shows on stage and you can watch woodcarvers, stonemasons and other artists create new art work, while graphic artists, photographers and others display their work. There are also acrobats, dancers, choirs, jugglers and fire-breathers performing at this lovely Christmas Market. The food varies from traditional Christmas snacks to gourmet menus and so that you don't have to freeze yourself there is an indoor dining area. Part of the entrance fee goes to Berlin charity for people in need.

Opening time: 25th Nov. – 30st Dec. from 11 till 22 / Entrance Fee: 1€

Second place is the Alexa Christmas Market

It is located by the Alexa shopping mall between Alexanderplatz and Jannowitzbrücke. This Christmas Market it the biggest Christmas Market in Berlin with a "Voodoo Jumper" as this years' biggest attraction, a ride that makes your heart drop to the floor. There are also other rides such as "BoosterMaxx" and "Black Hole", which is Europe's only dark indoor rollercoaster. A 60 meter Ferris wheel will be there as well. Along with all its heart racing activities, the market also offers great Christmas shopping.

Opening time: 25th Nov. – 23rd Dec. from 14 till 22

Third place is the Rote Rathaus Christmas Market

It is located by Rathhausstr. 15. One can already see this Christmas market from far away due to its glowing 50-meter Ferris wheel. The market offers varieties of Christmas food such as caramel continued on page 7

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apples, gingerbread and roasted almonds, as their sweets smell floats air. There is also a huge ice ring around the Neptune fountain with great music playing.

Opening time: 25th Nov. – 29th Dec. from 12 till 22

Fourth Place is the Schloss Charlottenburg Christmas Market

My favorite thing about this market is the way the Spandauer Damm buildings are illuminated at night. The festival of lights may have ended in October, however at Schloss Charlottenburg they continue until the end of December. There is a carousel and even a petting zoo, where pony rides are possible. New works of art and themed tents can be found at almost every stand.

Fifth place is the Opernpalais

This market exhibits art by artists from around the world. With over 150 stands, it's nearly impossible not to walk away without something. As always there are a great variety of baked goods, roasted almonds and Christmas drinks. If you are new to Berlin, this is an especially interesting market, as it is located right in the middle of . There are even carriage rides that go around the city center, equipped with blankets for those cold winter evenings.

universe for almost three hours. So, if you have time GO SEE THE MOVIE. And we recommend


